What is CDBG?

- Federal program funded by HUD.
- Administered in South Carolina by the SC Department of Commerce, Division of Grants Administration.
- Designed to provide assistance to units of local government in providing economic opportunities and meeting community revitalization needs, particularly for low and moderate income persons.



Community Development Block Grant

Who Can Apply?

- Units of Local Government Only
 - Towns
 - Cities
 - Counties



- Must Not be Within a CDBG Entitlement Area.
- All projects must meet a national objective and address eligible activity.

National Objectives

- Benefit Low and Moderate Income (LMI)
 Persons
- Aid in the Prevention or Elimination of Slums or Blight
- Meet Other Urgent Community Development Needs

Community Development Program

- Competitive
- Currently offered twice a year
- Minimum of \$50,000
- Maximum depends on type of project
- Ten percent match required
- Must be eligible activity
- Must meet national objective

Community Development Program Categories

- Community Infrastructure
- Community Enrichment
- Neighborhood Revitalization
- Local Priorities
- "Ready to Go" Public Facilities
- Business Development

Community Infrastructure

- Funds Available State-Wide: \$10,948,629
- Grant Maximum: \$1,000,000
- Eligible Activities: Water, Sewer, Roads, or Drainage Activities
- Application Requests Due: Friday, March 17, 2023
- Applications Due: Monday, April 17, 2023

Community Enrichment

- Funds Available State-Wide: \$3,000,000
- Grant Maximum: \$750,000
- Application Requests Due: <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>August 15, 2023</u>
- Applications Due: Friday, September 15, 2023

Eligible Activities

First Priority - Increasing Economic Competitiveness

- Brownfield projects or demolition of obsolete buildings
- Downtown streetscape improvements where there is significant business activity and prior investment

Second Priority - Education and Workforce Development

- Libraries facilities or services to provide expanded library services, computer equipment or internet access, especially broadband capabilities
- Publicly owned facilities that offer educational opportunities for adult literacy or to serve at risk LMI children or youth

Community Enrichment (Cont.)

Third Priority-Safe and Healthy Communities

- Transportation-oriented public facilities to serve LMI workforce populations
- Public safety facilities and services in LMI areas, such as police substations, or fire substations, or fire trucks that serve LMI residents
- Demolition of vacant, dilapidated residential structures to address and support crime prevention efforts in a targeted LMI neighborhood
- Health clinic facilities or equipment in underserved areas or multi-service centers for health or related social <u>services</u>
- Public facilities modifications to ensure accessibility for disabled persons or for energy efficiency improvements for CDBG eligible public facilities
- New sidewalks in LMI areas where there is a demonstrated need for safe neighborhood foot travel and connectivity to goods or services

Neighborhood Revitalization

Funds Available State-Wide: \$1,000,000

Grant Maximum: \$750,000

Application Requests Due: <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>August 15</u>, <u>2023</u>

O Applications Due: Friday, September 15, 2023

- Planning Phase: The targeted neighborhood must submit a locally funded revitalization plan that identifies community needs and prioritizes activities designed to revitalize the neighborhood with CDBG and other funds
- Implementation Phases; Activities May Include: Infrastructure, Public Facilities, Housing, Demolition and clearance of vacant and dilapidated properties, and Public Services.

Local Priorities Program

- Funds Available State-Wide: \$100,000,000
- Grant Maximum: \$300,000
- O Application Requests Due: <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>August 15, 2023</u>
- Applications Due: Friday, September 15, 2023

Eligible Activities

- These funds will be used for alternative grant activities that meet community development need of eligible municipalities.
- Special projects could include historic preservation, innovation, energy conservation, parks, and trails/greenways

"Ready to Go" Public Facilities

- Funds Available State-Wide: \$600,000
- O Grant Maximum: \$500,000 (a waiver will be considered for infrastructure projects addressing an urgent and compelling need, regional solution or system-wide improvements, as well as the extent of leveraging and a reasonable CDBG cost)
- Eligible Activities: Activities must be eligible under the Community Infrastructure or Community Enrichment Program.
 CDBG funds are for construction or demolition costs only.

Business Development Program

- O Funds Available State-Wide: \$2,000,000
- O Grant Maximum:
 - Job Creation/Retention: \$10,000 per job
 - Area economic development: \$500,000
 - Local goods and services:
 - Service area less than 20% poverty or 70% LMI \$350/LMI person
 - Service area equal/more than 20% poverty or 70% LMI -\$1,000/LMI person
- Eligible Activities: Infrastructure to assist new or expanding businesses that will result in the creation or retention of jobs, 51% of which must be available to low and moderate income persons.

Is There a Match Requirement?

Must match 10% of the Grant Request

The match may be in the form of cash, non-Commerce grants, waiver of fees, public or private investments, and documented volunteer or in-kind services. A loan obtained in direct support of the CDBG project may count as a cash match.
